

## Navigating autism representation in 'extraordinary attorney woo': A Korean drama perspective

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**Abstract** - This review examines the Korean drama Extraordinary Attorney Woo, which narrates the life of Woo Young-Woo, a lawyer with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). The series portrays the unique challenges and abilities of individuals with ASD, combining social difficulties and limited empathy with exceptional memory and intelligence. The drama seeks to inspire audiences by illustrating Woo's journey towards independence while confronting societal stigma and prejudice. The objective of this review is to critically analyse the portrayal of ASD in the series, highlighting its role in shaping public perception and fostering greater understanding and empathy for individuals with autism. The data collection involved document analysis, including a detailed review of the drama's episodes and a literature review on autism representation in media. This method enabled a comparison of the series' portrayal with existing studies and established characteristics of ASD. The analysis focused on the authenticity and sensitivity of the depiction, its adherence to or deviation from ASD traits, and its impact on public perceptions. The findings reveal that Extraordinary Attorney Woo successfully challenges stereotypes, promotes awareness, and provides an authentic representation of ASD. The drama emphasizes neurodiversity while showcasing the challenges and triumphs of individuals with autism. However, some dramatizations of ASD traits for narrative purposes were noted, highlighting the need for careful balance in future portrayals. In conclusion, Extraordinary Attorney Woo is a significant step towards fostering inclusivity and understanding. Recommendations include further collaboration with experts to ensure accuracy and continued focus on breaking stereotypes in media representations of autism.

### 1. Introduction

In recent years, the portrayal of diverse characters in media, particularly those depicting individuals with neurological differences, has garnered increasing attention. Amongst these representations, the Korean drama "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" stands out, as it explores the narrative of Woo Young-Woo, a lawyer diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). This drama unfolds the challenges faced by Woo Young-Woo, shedding light on the unique intersection of social difficulties, exceptional memory, and remarkable intelligence that individuals with ASD may experience.

The urgency of studying the portrayal of ASD in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" lies in its potential to influence societal perceptions and understanding of neurodiversity. With the rising prevalence of ASD diagnoses and the need for greater inclusivity in media representations, exploring

how this drama addresses the complexities of ASD becomes crucial for fostering empathy, breaking down stereotypes, and promoting awareness.

This study addresses several key research problems. Firstly, it seeks to critically analyze the accuracy and sensitivity of the portrayal of Autism Spectrum Disorder in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo." Additionally, the study aims to investigate the potential impact of the drama on public perceptions of individuals with ASD. Furthermore, it explores the broader implications of media representations of neurodiversity, considering how accurate depictions can contribute to societal inclusivity.

Research questions of the study is as follows.

- (1) How does "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" portray Autism Spectrum Disorder, considering the intersection of social difficulties, exceptional memory, and intelligence in the character Woo Young-Woo?
- (2) What is the potential impact of the drama on public perceptions and awareness of individuals with ASD?
- (3) How do accurate and sensitive portrayals in media contribute to fostering empathy and breaking down stereotypes associated with ASD?

This study employs a dual theoretical framework, combining Critical Discourse Analysis (CDA) (Hafner, 2017) and Text Analysis (Petter, 2023); (Banks & Banks, 2002) (Briones, 2016). Critical Discourse Analysis (Schiffrin et al., 2007); (Fairclough, 1995); (Aspian et al., 2022); (Ardiyansyah, 2020) allows for an examination of the language and discursive strategies used in the drama, while Text Analysis (Briones, 2016) provides a detailed exploration of the narrative structure and character development related to ASD. This combined framework aims to offer a comprehensive understanding of the portrayal of ASD in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo."

Haworth (2022) explores the relationship between local, national, and transnational narratives in foreign-language crime dramas from France, Italy, and Germany, and their impact on UK audiences. In the context of increasing access to foreign-language programs in post-Brexit Britain through platforms like the BBC, Walter Presents, and Netflix, the study focuses on popular dramas such as *Spiral*, *Mafiosa*, *Inspector Montalbano*, *Maltese: The Mafia Detective*, *Inspector Falke*, and *Dark*. Viewing groups in Hull from September to November 2018 were conducted to analyse audience perceptions of themes like national identity, nationhood, and linguistic stereotypes depicted in these dramas. The article presents findings on how these programs both reinforce and challenge cultural and linguistic stereotypes, highlighting their potential role in promoting language learning and intercultural awareness in the UK in the twenty-first century.

In this section, we present an overview of existing research on the portrayal of Autism Spectrum Disorder in various media forms. The review considers the impact of accurate representation in fostering understanding and acceptance, as well as the potential perpetuation of stereotypes through inaccurate depictions. By synthesizing the findings of previous studies, the analysis contextualizes the significance of "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" within the broader landscape of media portrayals of autism.

The study that aims to analyse the moral values depicted in the drama "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" and their application in Indonesian learning, specifically in shaping a profile of Pancasila students adopts a descriptive qualitative approach, utilizing dialogue scenes from the drama as the primary data source (Hardiyanti & Markhamah, 2023). Data collection involves observation and documentation, with content analysis as the chosen technique for analysis.

The research identifies two main categories of moral values portrayed in the drama: (1) individual-human relationships, encompassing qualities such as independence, critical reasoning, creative thinking, resilience, hard work, tolerance, forgiveness, and (2) interpersonal relationships, including themes of ending discrimination, collaboration, empathy, accountability, equal opportunities, compassion, and genuine friendship.

The application of these moral values from the drama is intended for the development of a Pancasila student profile aligned with an independent curriculum. The profile is structured around four dimensions: independence, mutual cooperation, critical reasoning, and creativity. This synthesis aims to contribute to the cultivation of well-rounded individuals with strong ethical foundations, as inspired by the moral values portrayed in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" (Hardiyanti & Markhamah, 2023).

Existing literature on the representation of neurological differences in Korean dramas is limited but growing. Previous studies have primarily focused on the portrayal of various health conditions in Korean media. This study builds upon this foundation by specifically delving into the representation of Autism Spectrum Disorder in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo." By reviewing and synthesizing previous research, this study aims to contribute to the evolving discourse on the depiction of neurodiversity in Korean popular culture.

The qualitative descriptive research explores the influence of the Korean drama "My Love From The Stars" on the Indonesian drama "Kau yang Berasal dari Bintang" (Sintowoko, 2016). The findings indicate similarities between the two dramas in terms of storyline, setting, and costumes. Both dramas feature a historical time frame depicting a love story between an alien and a human. In terms of costumes, "Kau yang Berasal dari Bintang" uses traditional Indonesian attire like Kebaya to depict a setting 400 years ago, while "My Love From The Stars" incorporates Hanbok as traditional Korean costumes. Additionally, both dramas share similarities in their settings, utilizing outdoor areas to represent pre-modernism and crowded cities to depict modernization. The study contributes to understanding the cross-cultural influences in the realm of television dramas (Sintowoko, 2016).

The evolution of the zombie genre in South Korean cinema, tracing its sporadic appearances from the first zombie film "Monstrous Corpse" in 1980 to the resurgence with films released between 2012 and 2018 (S.-A. Lee, 2021). The study focuses on four key films: "Ambulance" (2012), part of the Horror Stories anthology; "Train to Busan" (2016), a blockbuster marking South Korea's entry into the zombie apocalypse sub-genre; "Seoul Station" (2016), an animated prequel to "Train to Busan"; and "Rampant" (2018), a costume drama set in Korea's Joseon era. Using a cognitive studies approach, the article explores the conceptual metaphors that underlie these films, particularly emphasizing the common metaphor "LIFE IS A JOURNEY" and the distinctly Korean metaphor "THE NATION IS A FAMILY" (S.-A. Lee, 2021).

Student learning interest is not only influenced by the student's internal factors but also by the teacher. The role of the teacher in education and learning is central to the efforts to enhance students' interest, abilities, and achievements. Therefore, the teacher, as a motivator in the learning process, must strive to improve their quality because the success of the learning process depends significantly on the teacher's abilities and professionalism (Prasanti & Dewi, 2020).

The description of students' learning interest in the Islamic Religious Education learning process includes desires, expectations, and targets that students aim to achieve, creating a strong interest in doing something, including engaging in Islamic Religious Education learning activities. Therefore, the efforts and role of the teacher in influencing students' learning interest include managing the classroom effectively, opening and closing the learning process correctly and efficiently, applying various learning methods, and more.

Basili & Sacco (2020) examine the K-drama "Jealousy Incarnate," broadcasted by the Korean TV network SBS in 2016, using it as a case study to apply the Tie-Up Theory to a romantic narrative. The focus is on understanding how the narrative simulates human mating processes with a social cognition aspect. The analysis reveals that the female lead's choice of a male partner in this case does not align with the standard predictions from experimental research on human mating. This divergence highlights a limitation in experimental research, which tends to emphasize abstract preferences for potential partners without fully capturing the specific mechanisms influencing the selection of a partner in a given mating interaction. The paper contends that adopting a narrative simulation perspective offers complementary insights to experimental research and suggests that a more comprehensive theoretical approach, such as the Tie-Up Theory, can help integrate both perspectives.

The Korean Wave, also known as Hallyu or Neo-Hallyu, holds significant influence in the Middle East, a phenomenon not thoroughly explored in scholarly research (Elaskary, 2018). This article provides a concise history of Hallyu, highlighting its blend of cultural and economic features. The focus then shifts to analysing how the Arab Middle East receives this cultural wave, examining fan engagement on social media platforms. The article concludes by discussing the cultural, political, and economic advantages that Hallyu brings to Korea and the broader global landscape. For simplicity, the term Hallyu (or Neo-Hallyu) is consistently used throughout the paper instead of the Korean Wave.

The COVID-19 pandemic has severely impacted the global film industry, leading to a decline in sales and revenue. South Korea, known for its cultural exports like Korean drama and film, faced similar challenges. This paper employs qualitative methods to analyse how the South Korean film industry transformed its export strategy through Netflix (Laily & Purbantina, 2021). Despite the challenges posed by the pandemic, South Korean film exports experienced a significant 13.3% increase in 2020, with 975 movies. The accessibility of Korean movies on Netflix has contributed to growing consumer interest in South Korean culture, actors, and storytelling.

Fella & Murfianti (2020) explore the impact of the Hallyu, or Korean Wave, on product advertising in Indonesia, specifically focusing on the use of actors and discourses from Korean culture. The research, titled "Korean Drama Discourse in the Sprite Ad Version 'Kenyataan Gak Kayak Drama Korea,'" analyses a Sprite beverage advertisement that incorporates Korean drama discourse with humour at the story's conclusion. Utilizing descriptive qualitative research and the theoretical framework of advertising discourse structure, the study dissects the Korean drama discourse within the advertisement, examining its communication concepts, storyline, and location settings scene by scene. The findings reveal that the Sprite advertisement successfully incorporates Korean drama discourse, functioning as an effective and well-received message conveying the refreshing nature of the product with the tagline "Nyatanya Nyegerin" (In reality, it's refreshing).

This article explores the role of pop music in Korean TV series, specifically focusing on the "trendy drama" genre that emerged in the early 1990s. Targeting a younger audience, these dramas showcased modern urban lifestyles and integrated newly composed pop music as theme songs and background pieces during crucial moments in developing relationships. The analysis highlights the significant contribution of these songs to the narrative development of Korean TV series, serving as leitmotifs that establish connections to past developments and incidents. Three recent series, namely "Dokkaebi: The Lonely and Great God" (2016-2017), "While You Were Sleeping" (2017), and "Because This Is My First Life" (2017), are examined to illustrate how pop songs become integral elements, adding layers of meaning to scenes and contributing to the overall individual character of the series. Additionally, the article briefly touches on the role of music and singers in the marketing process (Keller, 2019).

Cayaban et al., (2023) investigate the factors influencing the buying decisions of Filipinos regarding Korean products and services, given the widespread popularity of Korean entertainment in the Philippines. Utilizing an extended theory of planned behaviour (TPB) approach, the study collected and analysed data from 306 Filipino participants through convenience sampling. Structural equation modelling (SEM) was employed to assess the correlation of latent constructs. The results indicate that attitude has the highest impact on behavioural intention, followed by influences from K-dramas, K-pop, and product quality. Surprisingly, product price was found to have a relatively low effect on behavioural intention. The study provides valuable insights for investors and business owners, offering a foundation for aligning business strategies with consumer behaviour in the purchase of Korean products and services.

Rosidi et al., (2019) explore the impact of globalization on young Muslims in Pekanbaru, Indonesia, focusing on their adoption of Islamic values from non-Arab regions, particularly influenced by Korean dramas. The study employs ethnographic methods, identifying informants who are pious young Muslims with Islamic educational backgrounds and a penchant for Korean television dramas. The research reveals that these individuals, who actively practice Islam in their daily lives, are influenced by Islamic values portrayed in Korean dramas. The values of hard work and perseverance, among others, are frequently depicted in these dramas, prompting Muslim youth to engage in a negotiation of these values within their own Islamic framework.

Kamil et al., (2018) explore the influence of the terms "stress" and "depression" on the audience of psychological Korean dramas, aiming to understand how these words are interpreted and to identify semantic field differences between them. Utilizing a qualitative descriptive method, the study involves data collection through interviews, questionnaires, and analysis of text in psychological Korean dramas. Semantic field theory is employed to examine the meaning of the words within the context of the dramas and their impact on the audience. The research reveals that some viewers misinterpret the meanings of stress and depression, and the semantic field of these terms is within the set semantic field, indicating paradigmatic relationships. The study concludes by highlighting the importance of reducing public misunderstanding regarding the meanings of stress

and depression, particularly influenced by the portrayal of these concepts in psychological Korean dramas.

Kurniawati et al., (2021) investigate the relationship between watching Korean dramas and lifestyle imitation behaviour, considering the influence of Korean dramas on Indonesian viewers. Korean dramas, a prominent aspect of the Korean wave and cultural globalization, gained popularity in Indonesia from 2002 onward, attracting audiences with surprising storylines, captivating actors, and trendy fashion. Utilizing a quantitative approach with the correlation method, the study involved 60 respondents from the 2017 Islamic Communication and Broadcasting Department of IAIN Surakarta. Through simple random sampling and linear regression analysis, the research found a very strong relationship, supported by a correlation value of 0.806. The results indicate a significant impact of watching Korean dramas on lifestyle imitation behaviour among the respondents, leading to the acceptance of the alternative hypothesis and rejection of the null hypothesis (Kurniawati et al., 2021).

Octaviani et al., (2021) investigate the impact of the Korean drama "True Beauty" on the buying interest in K-Beauty products within the TnT Label dance cover community in Cikarang. Motivated by the writer's interest in Korean drama shows, the study employs a quantitative method through an explanatory survey. The research focuses on understanding how the drama influences the community members' interest in purchasing K-Beauty products. The IMC (Integrated Marketing Communication) Theory serves as the theoretical framework for the study. The population comprises all members of the TnT Label Community in Cikarang, with data collected through questionnaire distribution and literature review.

The study investigates the impact of the message content and role characteristics of Park Saeroi, a hardworking entrepreneur in the Korean drama "Itaewon Class," on motivational behaviour towards entrepreneurship. Utilizing the uses and effect theory, the study categorizes variables into Intensity, Message Content, and Attractiveness, tailored to the characteristics of the show. The research involves an explanatory analysis technique with classical assumptions and simple regression analysis, based on data collected through a questionnaire from 66 respondents. Results reveal that respondents experience positive effects from "Itaewon Class," particularly in the Message Content and Attractiveness indicators, with unexpected effects in the Intensity indicator. Overall, the study suggests that respondents are influenced by the Korean drama and are motivated towards entrepreneurship (Hadiyani et al., 2021).

South Korean television dramas frequently incorporate ghost stories as a means of social critique, as exemplified in series such as *Dokkaebi: The Lonely and Great God* (2016-17), *Let's Fight, Ghost* (2016), and *Oh My Ghost* (2015). These dramas blend the ghost story genre with others to highlight the challenges faced by characters who are either ghosts or young individuals with the ability to see ghosts (Lee & Lee, 2019). The narrative underscores their liminal condition and the resulting isolation, with ghosts unable to communicate with the living and ghost seers set apart due to their uncanny ability. The absence of immediate families further intensifies their isolation in a society that values communal family ideals. These characters serve as symbolic representations of marginalized individuals, addressing issues related to gender, social status, or limited economic access. The dramas prompt viewers to empathize with these characters, fostering reflection on societal positions and contributing to a broader discourse on subjectivity and social critique.

Dwi et al., (2022) explore the impact of the Korean Wave or Hallyu, specifically through Korean dramas, on Indonesian teenagers. The Korean Wave refers to the global popularity of South Korean pop culture, which has influenced teenagers worldwide. In Indonesia, Korean products, particularly Korean dramas, have gained prominence. The objectives of the study are to understand how Indonesian teenagers perceive South Korean images portrayed in Korean dramas, their intention to visit South Korea in the future, the impacts of watching Korean dramas on consumer decision-making for Korean products, and whether it increases brand awareness among Indonesian teenagers. The research employs a qualitative methodology, with informants aged 20-21 years old. Data collection is conducted through interviews, aiming to enhance readers' insights into consumer decision-making influenced by the Korean Wave.

(Trinh et al., 2017) study goes into the philosophical foundation and epistemology of systemic functional grammar (SFG) formulated by Michael Halliday in the 1980s. SFG views language as a systemic resource for meaning and has had a significant impact on linguistics globally.



While Halliday's work primarily focuses on analysing English texts, the study aims to clarify the philosophical foundation of his SFG. The paper highlights three key aspects: the relationship between language, mind, and the world; the role of empiricism in Halliday's SFG; and the overarching goal of constructing a grammar for text analysis in modern English.

## 2. Method

The data for this review were collected through document analysis, specifically by thoroughly reviewing the episodes of "Extraordinary Attorney Woo." The study also involves a comprehensive review of existing literature on autism representation in the media to contextualize and compare the drama's portrayal with previous studies. By combining these methods, the review aims to provide a holistic analysis of the drama's approach to depicting ASD.

The study employed a dual-pronged approach to data collection. Firstly, a meticulous examination of the episodes of "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" was conducted through document analysis. This involved a detailed review of the drama's content to extract key information related to the portrayal of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) by the central character, Woo Young-Woo. Secondly, a comprehensive review of existing literature on autism representation in the media was undertaken. This literature review served to contextualize and compare the drama's depiction of ASD with insights gleaned from prior studies. The integration of these two methods aimed to provide a comprehensive and holistic analysis of the drama's approach to representing ASD.

## 3. Results and Discussion

### 3.1 Portray Autism Spectrum Disorder "Extraordinary Attorney Woo"

The portrayal of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" is multifaceted, emphasizing the intersectionality of social difficulties, exceptional memory, and intelligence within the character Woo Young-Woo. The analysis delves into various aspects of the drama to discern how these elements are depicted and intertwined.

The drama effectively illustrates Woo Young-Woo's challenges in social interactions. His difficulties in maintaining eye contact, interpreting abstract ideas literally, and expressing emotions are portrayed with sensitivity. These characteristics align with common traits associated with ASD, providing an authentic representation of the social struggles individuals with autism may face.

The depiction of Woo Young-Woo's friendships, or lack thereof, contributes to the portrayal of social difficulties. The drama explores his challenges in forming and maintaining friendships, shedding light on the isolating nature of ASD. The nuanced approach to these dynamics adds depth to the character's representation.

Woo Young-Woo's exceptional memory is showcased through his mastery of legal knowledge. The drama effectively highlights how his heightened memory contributes positively to his professional life as an attorney. This aspect of his character challenges stereotypes by emphasizing the strengths that individuals with ASD may possess, showcasing their unique abilities.

Scenes where Woo Young-Woo recalls intricate details, such as legal clauses and case precedents, provide a glimpse into the extraordinary memory often associated with autism. The drama uses these moments to not only showcase his legal prowess but also to emphasize the diversity of cognitive abilities within the autism spectrum.

The portrayal of Woo Young-Woo's intelligence goes beyond rote memorization. The drama illustrates his problem-solving skills, critical thinking, and ability to navigate complex legal situations. This challenges stereotypes by presenting a character with ASD who excels in a demanding profession, showcasing the cognitive diversity within the autism spectrum.

"Extraordinary Attorney Woo" consciously emphasizes Woo Young-Woo's strengths rather than focusing solely on his challenges. By showcasing his intelligence, the drama contributes to a more balanced and positive representation of individuals with ASD, encouraging viewers to recognize and appreciate their unique abilities.

The portrayal of Autism Spectrum Disorder in "Extraordinary Attorney Woo" is characterized by a nuanced exploration of the intersection of social difficulties, exceptional memory, and intelligence within the character Woo Young-Woo. The drama succeeds in presenting a multi-

dimensional representation of ASD, challenging stereotypes, and fostering a more comprehensive understanding of individuals with autism. Through a thoughtful approach to character development, the drama contributes positively to the broader discourse on neurodiversity in media.

The drama meticulously captures Woo Young-Woo's social interactions, providing a nuanced portrayal of the challenges he faces. His struggle with maintaining eye contact is not merely a superficial trait but is presented as a poignant reflection of the difficulties individuals with ASD encounter in understanding and reciprocating non-verbal cues. Viewers witness the internal conflict Woo Young-Woo experiences, navigating the complexities of social communication.

The depiction of interpreting abstract ideas literally adds layers to his character. This aspect goes beyond a simple adherence to social conventions; it serves as a window into the cognitive processes of someone with ASD. The drama skillfully demonstrates the impact of this trait on his daily life, showcasing moments of both frustration and revelation.

Emotion expression becomes a central theme in Woo Young-Woo's character development. The drama carefully navigates his challenges in understanding and conveying emotions, providing viewers with a deep insight into the emotional world of someone with ASD. Moments of vulnerability and growth are delicately woven into the narrative, highlighting the human experience beyond the diagnostic label.

The exploration of Woo Young-Woo's friendships, or lack thereof, is a pivotal aspect of the narrative. The drama not only portrays his struggles in initiating and maintaining connections but delves into the emotional toll this isolation takes. Viewers witness the yearning for connection juxtaposed with the barriers presented by ASD, creating a poignant narrative thread that adds emotional resonance to the character.

The drama avoids simplifying the complexities of friendship dynamics, presenting a realistic portrayal of the challenges faced by individuals with ASD in forming and sustaining meaningful relationships. It steers away from clichéd narratives, opting for authenticity in depicting the impact of social difficulties on Woo Young-Woo's personal life.

Woo Young-Woo's exceptional memory is not a mere plot device but a central element shaping his identity as an attorney. The drama masterfully integrates his legal prowess with his cognitive strengths, showcasing how his ability to recall legal details becomes a unique advantage in his profession. This challenges stereotypes by portraying ASD as a spectrum encompassing diverse cognitive abilities.

The drama strategically utilizes Woo Young-Woo's legal acumen to break down preconceived notions about the limitations of individuals with ASD. Scenes of him effortlessly navigating legal complexities serve not only as a testament to his memory but also as a powerful narrative device challenging societal perceptions.

The recollection of details is presented not as a random display of memory but as a deliberate narrative choice. Each instance of detailed recollection serves a dual purpose – advancing the plot and reinforcing Woo Young-Woo's character as a multidimensional individual whose cognitive strengths redefine traditional expectations associated with ASD.

Beyond exceptional memory, the drama accentuates Woo Young-Woo's problem-solving skills, critical thinking, and adaptability. It dismantles the stereotype that individuals with ASD are confined to rigid thinking patterns, showcasing his ability to navigate intricate legal situations with creativity and ingenuity.

The drama consciously avoids reducing Woo Young-Woo's intelligence to a single-dimensional portrayal. Instead, it emphasizes his cognitive diversity, portraying him not merely as an attorney with ASD but as a strategic thinker who excels in a demanding profession. This nuanced approach challenges the narrative of limitation often associated with ASD.

By highlighting his problem-solving skills, the drama contributes to a broader conversation about recognizing and appreciating the strengths of individuals with ASD. It encourages viewers to re-evaluate their understanding of intelligence, acknowledging the varied ways in which cognitive abilities manifest within the autism spectrum.

"Extraordinary Attorney Woo" makes a conscious effort to emphasize Woo Young-Woo's strengths rather than perpetuating a deficit-based narrative. The drama resists the temptation to define him solely by his challenges, presenting a character whose intelligence is a source of empowerment rather than limitation.
